

THE LOUIS KNOTT KOONTZ MEMORIAL AWARD. *An annual award of \$750 for the most deserving contribution to the Pacific Historical Review. Selection is made by the Review's Board of Editors.*

THE PACIFIC COAST BRANCH BOOK AWARD. *An award of \$750 for a first book by a scholar. The award will be announced at the annual meeting of the Pacific Coast Branch (PCB) and in the Pacific Historical Review.*

ELIGIBILITY: Open to scholars who reside in the states, provinces, or territories from which the Branch draws its membership. Entries must have been published within a year of the date of submission and must not have been submitted in any previous year.

TO ENTER: Presses should submit nominations from books published in 2010 to each member of the Awards Committee. Deadline for submission is April 1, 2011.

THE W. TURRENTINE JACKSON ARTICLE PRIZE. *An award of \$750 for the best article by a graduate student. The winning essay will be published in the Pacific Historical Review.*

ELIGIBILITY: Essay should be on a topic within the *PHR's* field of concentration.

THE W. TURRENTINE JACKSON DISSERTATION AWARD. *An award of \$750 for the author of the most outstanding dissertation on any aspect of the history of the American West.*

ELIGIBILITY: The author must receive the Ph.D. in history between March 1, 2010, and February 28, 2011. The department chair must submit a letter certifying the author has been awarded the degree. Dissertations under contract consideration or under contract are eligible for this award.

TO ENTER: Please send a copy of the dissertation to each member of the Awards Committee by April 1, 2011. A letter certifying the author has been awarded the Ph.D. should be sent to Peter Blodgett, Executive Director, AHA-PCB, Huntington Library, 1151 Oxford Road, San Marino, CA 91108.

THE NORRIS AND CAROL HUNDLEY BOOK AWARD. *An award of \$750 for a distinguished book on any historical subject.*

ELIGIBILITY: Open to scholars who reside in the states, provinces, or territories from which the Branch draws its membership. Submissions can be first or subsequent publications by young or mature scholars. Candidates cannot compete for both the Hundley and PCB book awards.

TO ENTER: Presses should submit nominations from books published in 2010 to each member of the Awards Committee. Deadline for submission is April 1, 2011.

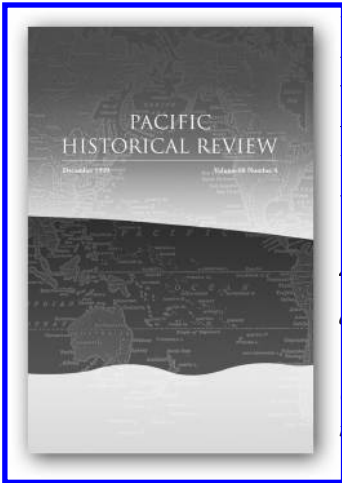

Editorial Fellowships at the *Pacific Historical Review*, 2012–2013

The *Pacific Historical Review* offers two year-long graduate editorial fellowships that run from September 16, 2012, through September 15, 2013, for graduate students enrolled in the Portland State University history program. Both fellowships provide a stipend, a graduate tuition waiver, and support for travel to a major professional conference as a representative of the *Pacific Historical Review*.

The Caroline P. Stoel Editorial Fellowships, endowed in 2001 by the Stoel family, the Wessinger Foundation, Ann and William Swindells, Edmund and Harriett Hayes, and Robert and Cecilia Huntington, carry, respectively, annual stipends of \$10,000, usually awarded to a second-year student, and \$8,000, usually awarded to an incoming student. Entering students, however, are eligible for either fellowship.

These fellowships offer an excellent opportunity to explore careers in history beyond teaching, preparing a student for work in the field of historical editing and writing for national, state, and local historical societies and journals, university presses, and more.
